## Welcome to Cub Scout Pack 451

### Things each Cub Scout needs:

Each Cub Scout needs a uniform (shirt, neckerchief and slide to use with his neckerchief) as well as a handbook. Typically, blue pants are worn with this to complete the uniform. The neckerchief, slide & handbook are specific to his age-based group (Tiger, Wolf, Bear or Webelo as shown in Meetings section below). Traditionally, the blue scout shirt is worn (either short or long sleeves); boy scouts typically wear a beige shirt, so sometimes our WeBeLs will choose that color. For his shirt, you need to purchase the following patches: pack numbers (451), the fleur de lis (purple round patch). Typically, our pack supplies the Patriot Path Council patch since it is only sold in the Scout shop. The shirt already has the American flag on it. All of this can be purchased at the Patriots Path Council Scout shop at 1 Saddle Road, Cedar Knolls, NJ 07927 where proceeds from the sales go to support Scouting or at Effingers at 513 West Union Ave, Bound Brook. Your son may also want the hat, belt or red vest for activity patches, these are optional. The placement for the patches on his uniform is covered in the handbook (note: our pack does not use den numbers/emblems or Quality Units patches mentioned in the handbook).

### Meetings:

Cub scouts are grouped in Dens by grade level. The goal of the meeting is to accomplish the material in the handbook as well as to provide fun, positive experiences that help each boy develop character, learn about what it means to be a good citizen and encourage him to be physically, mentally and morally fit. Each boy should bring his handbook to the Den meeting so the Den Leader can record achievements that have been completed.

The time/place of the Den meetings are determined by the Den Leader (the leader of the group). Typically meetings are rotated through parent's houses with each of the parents taking responsibility for organizing and facilitating one of the meetings. Your Den Leader will contact you shortly with more specifics about your group. The Dens are as follows:

Tiger	1 <sup>st</sup> Grade
Wolf	2 <sup>nd</sup> Grade
Bear	3 <sup>rd</sup> Grade
Webelos I	4 <sup>th</sup> Grade
Webelos II	5 <sup>th</sup> Grade

There are also monthly pack meetings where all of the dens come together for a fun, educational and/or service activity as well as to celebrate the achievements of the cub scouts by presenting badges and other awards earned. These are held once per month typically on a Friday from 7:00 – 8:30 pm at Mt. Prospect School, our charter sponsor.

### Rank:

The first thing a boy must accomplish upon joining Cub Scouts is earning the Rank of *Bobcat*. The requirements for earning this badge are in the beginning of each Rank's handbook and include learning the Cub Scout Promise, the Law of the Pack and the Cub Scout motto.

The primary goal of the Cub Scout during the year is to earn his age-based rank (Tiger, Wolf, Bear or WeBeLos badge). In order to accomplish this, there are a series of achievements listed in the hand book that the Cub Scout must complete. (This is known as the Tiger/Wolf/Bear trail.) Many of these will be done as a part of the Den, but any can be completed individually with family assistance. The Den Leader will communicate to each family which achievements will be collectively versus individually worked on.

### Optional Activities:

There are a number of optional activities that the Cub Scout can participate in. These can be worked on while the rank is being achieved, but should not take precedence over it.

### Parent Involvement:

Having active and involved parents will enhance the experience for our Scouts. As such there are a number of things that you can do:

- 1) **Share your talents:** Do you like woodworking, hiking, wildlife, tennis, math, basketball...? Are you affiliated with the police, first aid squad, library...? Any of these and many other hobbies, skills, affiliations can help the scouts with their achievements or earn belt loops & pins. Think about what you can offer and talk to your Den Leader.
- 2) Online Web based Training is required for all adults - <http://www.myscouting.org>. It is highly recommended that all parents take Youth Protection training and This is Scouting. If you have not logged on before, you will need to create a personal account (the steps are easy) before taking the course. Once you are signed on, there is a big section in the middle that tells you how to navigate to Youth Protection Training. When you are done, please print the completion certificate and bring it with you to the pack meeting to provide it to the Committee Chair.
- 3) **BALOO training:** Basic Adult Leadership Outdoor Training – In order to go camping, we need adults who are trained. Courses are typically held once or twice a year. The Committee Chair will disseminate information about upcoming sessions.
- 4) **University of Scouting:** In October of each year a “University of Scouting” is held at Randolph Middle School. It is an excellent opportunity for parents to learn tips and skills that will allow you to help further enhance the Scouting experience for our sons. Sessions are held on a diverse set of topics such as: first aid, games, outings & trips and robotics. This website will provide you with more information <http://main.ppbsa.org/>. - 5) **Leadership Committee:** The committee chair meets with Den Leaders and other parents interested in helping with the administration of the pack on a monthly basis. Please contact the Committee Chair if you have interest in participating.

(Venturing and Sea Scout members: It is important that you share this with your parents.)

## Welcome to the Boy Scouts of America!

Please take the time to review this material and reflect upon its importance.

## The BSA and the Chartered Organization

The Boy Scouts of America makes Scouting available to our nation's youth by chartering community organizations to operate Cub Scout packs, Boy Scout troops, Varsity Scout teams, Venturing crews, and Sea Scout ships.

The chartered organization must provide an adequate and safe meeting place and capable adult leadership, and must adhere to the principles and policies of the BSA. The BSA local council provides unit leader training, program ideas, camping facilities, literature, professional guidance for volunteer leaders, and liability insurance protection.

## Scouting's Volunteers and You

Scouting's adult volunteers provide leadership at the unit, district, council, and national levels. Many are parents of Scouts; many entered Scouting as youth members. Each chartered organization establishes a unit committee, which operates its Scouting unit, selects leadership, and provides support for a quality program. Unit committees depend on parents for membership and assistance.

The unit committee selects the Cubmaster, Scoutmaster, Varsity Scout Coach, Venturing Advisor, or Sea Scout Skipper, subject to approval of the head of the chartered organization or the chartered organization representative and of the BSA. The unit leader must be a good role model because our children's values and lives will be influenced by that leader. You need to know your child's unit leader and be involved in the unit committee's activities so you can evaluate and help direct that influence.

Scouting uses a fun program to promote character development, citizenship training, and personal fitness for every member. You can help by encouraging attendance, assisting with your child's advancement, attending meetings for parents, and assisting when called upon to help.

**Youth Protection Begins With You™.** Child abuse is a serious problem in our society, and unfortunately, it can occur anywhere, even in Scouting. Youth safety is of paramount importance to Scouting. For that reason, the BSA continues to create barriers to abuse beyond what have previously existed in Scouting.

The Boy Scouts of America places the greatest importance on providing the most secure environment possible for our youth members. To maintain such an environment, the BSA has developed numerous procedural and leadership selection policies, and provides parents and leaders with numerous online and print resources for the Cub Scout, Boy Scout, and Venturing programs.

All Cub Scout, Boy Scout, Venturing, and Sea Scout parents should review *How to Protect Your Children From Child Abuse: A Parent's Guide* booklet in the Cub Scout and Boy Scout handbooks or at [www.scouting.org/training/youthprotection](http://www.scouting.org/training/youthprotection).

## Program Policies

Chartered organizations agree to use the Scouting program in accordance with their own policies as well as those of the BSA. The program is flexible, but major departures from BSA methods and policies are not permitted. As a parent, you should be aware that

- BSA adult registration is restricted to qualified people who subscribe to the precepts of the Declaration of Religious Principle, the Scout Oath, the Scout Law, and the BSA Standards of Leadership.
- Citizenship activities are encouraged, but partisan political activities are prohibited.
- Military training and drills are prohibited. Marksmanship and elementary drill for ceremonies are permitted.
- While Boy Scouts of America recognizes the importance of religious faith and duty, it leaves sectarian religious instruction to the member's religious leaders and family.
- Members who do not belong to a unit's religious chartered organization shall not be required to participate in its religious activities.

## Youth Protection Policies

- Two registered adult leaders or one registered adult leader and a parent of a participant, one of whom must be 21 years of age or older, are required on all trips and outings. If trips and outings are coeducational, leaders of both genders must be present.
- One-on-one activities between youth members and adult leaders are never permitted. Even personal Scout conferences must be conducted in plain view of others.
- Corporal punishment, hazing and bullying are not permitted in Scouting. Only constructive discipline is acceptable. Parents and unit leaders must work together to solve discipline problems.
- New leaders are required to take Youth Protection training within 30 days of registering, and Youth Protection training must be taken every two years.
- We encourage all parents to be involved with their Scout. There are no "secret" organizations in Scouting and all Scouting activities are open to parental visitation.
- If you suspect that a child has been abused, immediately contact the local authorities and the Scout executive.

## Excerpt from the Declaration of Religious Principle

The Boy Scouts of America maintains that no member can grow into the best kind of citizen without recognizing an obligation to God and, therefore, recognizes the religious element in the training of the member, but it is absolutely nonsectarian in its attitude toward that religious training. Its policy is that the home and organization or group with which the member is connected shall give definite attention to religious life. Only persons willing to subscribe to these precepts of the Declaration of Religious Principle and to the Bylaws and codes of the Boy Scouts of America shall be entitled to certificates of membership.

## Policy of Nondiscrimination

Youth membership in the BSA is open to all boys and young adults who meet the joining requirements. Membership in Scouting, advancement, and achievement of leadership in Scouting units are open to all youth without regard to race, ethnic background, or sexual orientation, and are based on individual merit.

**Ethnic background information.** Please fill in the appropriate circle on the application to indicate ethnic background. This information helps the BSA plan for membership success in serving all youth.

**Tips for completing the Application for Youth Membership:**

- > Print—do not use cursive.
- > Use black or dark blue ink.
- > Press firmly when printing.
- > Print one letter only in each box.
- > Use uppercase letters and stay within the blue boxes for legibility.
- > Fill in circles; do not use check marks.
- > Make sure you have all needed signatures on application.
- > Don't alter the application—it could affect the quality of the scan.

On late registrations it may be necessary to deliver back issues. *Boys' Life* will not begin for at least two months after you register.

**Joining Requirements  
Parent/Guardian Information**

**Cub Scout Pack**

Pack membership is open to boys.

1. Complete the information on the application page and sign your name, indicating approval.
2. Give the completed application and fees to the Cubmaster.

**Tiger Cub**—Must be under the age of 8, have completed kindergarten or be in the first grade, or be age 7.

**Cub Scout**—Must have completed first grade but not completed third grade, or be age 8 or 9.

**Webelos Scout**—Must have completed third grade but not completed fifth grade, or be age 10 but not yet 11½.

**Parent Agreement**

I have read the Scout Oath or Promise and Scout Law, and I want my son to join the pack. I will assist him in abiding by the policies of the Boy Scouts of America and of his pack's chartered organization. I will

- *While he is a Tiger Cub, serve as his adult partner and participate in all meetings and activities and approve his advancement.\**
- *While he is a Cub Scout, help him grow as a Cub Scout and approve his Cub Scout advancement.*
- *While he is a Tiger Cub, Cub Scout, or Webelos Scout, attend monthly pack meetings and take part in other activities; assist pack leaders as needed.*

**\*If the parent is not serving as the adult partner, the parental signature on the application indicates approval of the adult partner and also if the adult partner does not live at the same address as the Tiger Cub, a separate adult application is required.**

**Health information.** Please fill out the Annual Health and Medical Record, No. 680-001, found on [www.scouting.org/forms](http://www.scouting.org/forms) and give it to the unit leader.

**Venturing Crew/Sea Scout Ship (Coeducational)**

I submit my \$24 registration fee for one year. I am at least 13 years of age and have completed the eighth grade or am 14 years of age and not yet 21. Must have parent/guardian approval if under 18 years of age.

Venturers and Sea Scouts registered in a crew or ship prior to their 21st birthday may continue as members after their 21st birthday until the crew or ship recharter or until they reach their 22nd birthday, whichever comes first.

Venturing and Sea Scouting include challenging physical and mental activities. If you have not recently had a complete medical examination, you are urged to see your family physician. Notify your Advisor/Skipper if you require special medication or if your physician recommends limited activity. Please fill out the Annual Health and Medical Record, No. 680-001, found on [www.scouting.org/forms](http://www.scouting.org/forms) and give it to the unit leader.

**Boy Scout Troop/Varsity Team**

**Boy Scout Troop**

Your son can be a Scout if he has completed the fifth grade and is at least 10 years old or is age 11 or has earned the Arrow of Light Award and is at least 10 years old, but has not reached age 18.

1. Complete the application (sign your name, indicating approval).
2. Give the completed application and fees to the Scoutmaster.

**Health information.** Please fill out the Annual Health and Medical Record, No. 680-001, found on [www.scouting.org/forms](http://www.scouting.org/forms) and give it to the unit leader.

**Varsity Team**

Varsity Scouting—A male youth must be at least 14 years of age and not yet 18.

**(Complete the application process as above and give it to the Varsity Coach.)**

**Health information.** Varsity Scouting involves strenuous activities. You should inform your Varsity Scout Coach of any condition that might limit your son's participation. Please fill out the Annual Health and Medical Record, No. 680-001, found on [www.scouting.org/forms](http://www.scouting.org/forms) and give it to the unit leader.
